

## **Community Partner Spotlight**



The International Rescue Committee (IRC) in Richmond has a robust Early Childhood Program that supports parents, assists with preschool registration, and highlights learning opportunities at home and across the region. In July 2023, the IRC began developing a "Learning Together" group for those families with young children who were unable to attend preschool. Focusing on the Basics, this class taught young ones and their parents' skills to create a seamless transition to kindergarten in the fall.

IRC supported the enrollment of 28 preschoolers for the 2024-2025 school year, with 25 students in Henrico County Public Schools and 3 in Richmond Public Schools. We have coordinated preschool open houses and conducted home visits with each family over the summer to encourage school readiness and healthy behaviors.

Helping young clients and their families begin their school career in a safe and encouraging way is just one way that the IRC continues to provide support. The Early Childhood Program at the IRC in Richmond helps young learners take that first step toward a successful educational journey and partnerships like the Imagination Library allow our Youth team to provide students with fun and engaging materials that will help along the way. 
Of course, we recommend reading the book before you watch the movie!

### **Count Sets of Objects**

While you read with your child, encourage your child to point to each illustration on the page and count together. See how many there are in total! "One, two, three, four - there are four illustrations!" You can also challenge your child with counting the illustrations per page, the illustrations per book, or even the number of words in a sentence.
